# Contents of the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2016

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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

## Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are "the promotion of social inclusion among the deaf community who are socially excluded from society, or parts of society, as a result of being deaf by encouraging, supporting and developing the provision of broadcasting of sign-presented content (in any media) for the members of the deaf community".

## Public benefit

The audience for BSLBT programmes is the Deaf community whose first and preferred language is British Sign Language. English is at best a second language, and indeed written and spoken language is not part of Deaf people's natural experience or culture. This means that subtitling on television is often a challenge - and real access to, and understanding of, many programmes may be limited.

BSLBT aims to address the social exclusion of Deaf people. It is the sole provider of television programmes made specifically for the Sign Language community. As well as providing vital information in their native language, here Deaf people can also see themselves and their lives reflected, and their experiences and culture shared and acknowledged through their preferred language. Deaf children and young deaf people at last have role models to identify with, while a geographically fragmented deaf population is brought together and validated as a community. In addition, the programmes provide visibility of the Deaf community to the mainstream world.

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2).

## Aims of the charity

The aims of the charity are:

- To engage with the Deaf community to find out their views on what programmes and other content they wish to see
- To provide a wide range of television programmes made in British Sign Language by Deaf people for Deaf people
- To make it as easy as possible to find and watch BSL Zone content on television and online

## Main objectives for the year

The BSLBT Business Plan sets out objectives in seven areas:

- Audience engagement
- Content Distribution (the BSL Zone on television)
- Website, including the BSL Zone online
- Finance & Resources
- External Relations
- Governance

## Audience Engagement:

- The main tools for measuring television audiences cannot provide accurate data on audience numbers for the BSL Zone, but the data that is available indicates that in 2016 on the Community
- Channel 146,000 people watched a BSL Zone programme for at least three minutes, down from 198,000 in 2015. The Community Channel does not support subtitling on its programmes so the channel is still not a destination for Deaf people. See Table 1 below.
- The figures for Film Four, with only one slot per week, tend to be much stronger: 271,000 watched BSL Zone programming for at least three minutes, showing a slight drop on 2015.

- Data for viewing programmes online is taken from the video-hosting platform, vzaar. In 2016 there were 917,343 page viewings and 227,022 certified page plays of BSL Zone content. (vzaar changed their methodology for producing analytics during 2016 and so no comparisons are given for 2015.)
- Viewers can give feedback in writing, or in BSL using a video feedback tool embedded on every programme page. A short explanatory video in BSL was published in 2016 to encourage more feedback on programmes.
- By the end of 2016 more than 2,771 (2015: 2,567) people and organisations had signed up to receive a weekly email newsletter. For people who don't use the internet, the Trust also continues to send out a quarterly mail-out of postcards giving details of forthcoming programmes on television.
- BSLBT continued to be well represented at larger events such as Deaffest in Wolverhampton in May, the BDA Congress in Torquay in July, and the Deaf50+ at Lowestoft, Norfolk in October.
- The Trust welcomed Jen Dodds as Web Editor during 2016. With increased effort and more regular postings, the number of 'likes' of the BSL Zone Facebook grew sharply again from 7,859 at the end of 2015 to 12,662 on 31st December 2016, and there were 1,313,228 views of BSL Zone videos on Facebook over the course of 2016.
- A modest amount of money (£10K) was spent 'boosting' programme by sending posts to the 'friends' of those people who already 'like' the BSL Zone on Facebook.
- There was also a significant rise in BSL Zone Twitter followers from around 3,000 to more than 5,000.

## Content:

• Eighteen programmes were commissioned or acquired in 2016 (18: 2015) from nine different companies, as Table 2 below shows. As well as the main programme, a 30-second promo and a five-minute Behind-the-Scenes film were also contracted for all programmes.

# Distribution:

 The BSL Zone maintained its four 30-minute weekly slots on two Freeview channels: three on the Community Channel and one on Film4 as Table 5 shows.

• Work started on the BSL Zone app in 2016 and it is scheduled to launch in spring 2017. The app will offer live streaming of programmes and, importantly, a 28-day download feature so that people can watch BSL Zone content without needing to be connected to the internet.

## Website:

- The Trust receives statistics and analytics data on its website from two sources: Google Analytics and vzaar, the video player
  which hosts all video content on the BSL Zone online. Unfortunately the two sets of data sometimes offer a contradictory
  picture.
- However, the total data usage for BSL programmes on vzaar is available and shows the considerable growth in consumption
  of BSL Zone content over the years 2014-2016 as Table 6 below demonstrates. In 2015 the total data consumption was 22.85
  terrabytes, and in 2016 the total data consumption was 72.97 terrabytes.

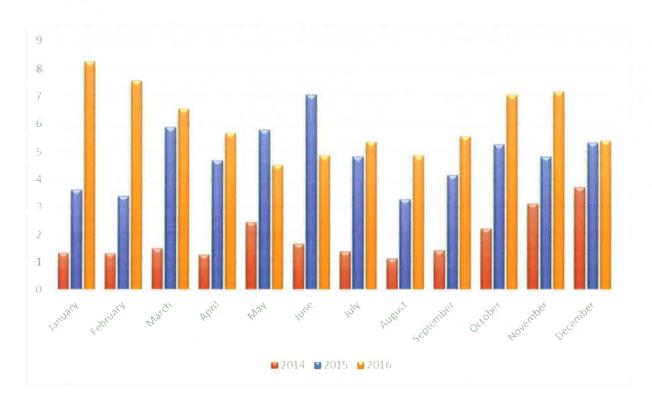

## Finance and resources:

- The Trust recruited a Head of Content in June 2016. Kerena Marchant has an impressive CV in Deaf and mainstream television programme making, having worked at the BBC for more than 20 years. She is a fluent BSL user and brings a wealth of experience of many different production genres. Specialist freelancers continue to carry out specific projects and to be BSLBT's Executive Producers on selected programme commissions.
- After eight years the Trust decided to establish a permanent base and has rented a small office near Old St in London. Having
  a 'home' is benefiting the staff team's communications, and programme makers and other visitors have a consistent destination
  for meetings with BSLBT.
- BSLBT now owns all rights in all programmes that the Trust has commissioned: there are a few third-party rights still to resolve but the number is not material.
- In preparation for the BSL Zone app, the Trust undertook a major project to upgrade its programme archive and to move to a different video player, Wistia. Three of the key benefits of this are:
  - There is a subtitling feature which viewers can toggle on and off at any point during a programme. Previously, two different versions of the programme needed to be available, (one with and one without subtitles) and the viewer needed to choose at the start which to watch.
  - o The programmes are now available in HD
  - Improved data and analytics. As stated elsewhere in this report programme statistics have been unconsistent and difficult to interpret.

#### **External relations:**

The Trust held a meeting with its broadcaster subscribers in early December 2016, hosted by Sky, to report to them on the
activities and progress of the Trust. Individual meetings were also held with several broadcasters at their convenience: uktv,
Discovery Networks Europe, Disney and Viacom.

#### Governance:

• BSLBT's Memorandum & Articles require a rotation in trustees, with any trustee being limited to serving a maximum of two three-year terms. In 2016 Marianne Matthews and Rubbena Aurangzeb-Tariq joined Board which is now at full strength.

Finally, the Board would like to thank the programme-makers, participants in programmes and all BSL Zone viewers - as well as the dedicated staff team -- for their continuing support. And they also wish to thank the broadcaster subscribers, who created BSLBT in partnership with the Deaf Community, for their continuing support.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Principal funding sources

BSLBT was set up in 2008 as an alternative way for independent broadcasters to meet their regulatory duty to provide programming in British Sign Language (BSL). Independent broadcasters with between 0.5% and 1% of audience share can choose either to source and broadcast programmes presented in sign language themselves or to contribute to BSLBT to make programmes in sign language for the Deaf audience.

In May 2015 Ofcom published the outcome of its Review of Signing Arrangements for Relevant TV channels, asking whether the amount of signed programming on low audience channels should be increased, and if channels that choose to pay alternative contributions should increase the amount they pay over time. They concluded that the amount of signing on low audience channels should increase over time and that channels choosing to pay alternative contributions should increase the amount they pay over time. This meant that the BSLBT subscription level for 2016 rose to £24,500 per channel to take account of inflation since 2009, and from 2017 onwards there will be further increases to match the equivalent rises in the amount of signed programming per channel.

Sixty-six channels from 14 broadcasters contributed £24,500 per qualifying channel to BSLBT in 2016, providing an income of £1,617,000. See Table 9 below. In addition, £90,000 was made available from the 2015 surplus to fund more programmes and the audience research.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

## Principal funding sources

The board's strategy is to allocate a minimum of 70% of annual spend to programming and distribution, with approximately 10% for audience engagement and no more than 15% to management and governance. In 2016, spend on content and distribution was 60% (74% in 2015), management and governance costs remained at 10% and audience engagement dipped from 9% to 6.5%.

Development for two short series (Small World and Deaf Funny) took place in 2016 but production needed to be delayed into 2017 and so funds not spent on these projects (£440K) has been transferred into a designated Programme Fund.

## Investment policy and objectives

The Finance & Audit committee seeks to maximise the return on cash held during the year with the need to protect absolutely the capital. The current policy and practice is that the reserve, and any cash sums available for shorter terms due to high balances at certain times of year, will be invested with the best interest rates available from the charity's bank.

# Reserves policy

The trustees have examined the charity's requirements for unrestricted reserves in the light of the main risks to the organisation. Having taken into consideration the facts that subscribing broadcasters pay in advance, overheads are low and the charity now has a sizeable library of programming to call on, the board has decided that the charity should maintain unrestricted non-designated reserves of at least £200,000. At the end of 2016 the unrestricted general reserve was £234,523. The Board will review the Reserves Policy in 2017.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The Risk Register is reviewed regularly by the Finance & Audit Committee. The top risks in 2016 were:

- Potential loss of audience if there is not enough new material to broadcast
- · Shortage of enough good programme tenders to meet commissioning objectives
- Increased subscription levels lead broadcasters to consider other options than BSLBT

There are plans in place to mitigate all key risks. For example, the Trust has made sure it is available to its broadcaster subscribers and organises at least one update meeting with them all each year. From 2017 the Trustees Report and Accounts will be adapted into an accessible and visual form online and in print.

## **FUTURE PLANS**

The Board at its Awayday in October 2016 began a strategic review of its business plan with the aim of building on previous successes to take the organisation on to a new phase as its reaches its 10th anniversary in 2018, and to address any significant issues and risks. Four key areas were identified: Communications, Content, Distribution, and Management & Governance. Each of these areas has been the subject of a board debate and the final business plan will be discussed and agreed at the 2017 Awayday in May.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## Governing document

The charity constitutes a company limited by guarantee as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The British Sign Language Broadcasting Trust (BSLBT) was set up in 2008 as an alternative way for independent broadcasters to meet their regulatory duty to provide programming in British Sign Language (BSL). BSLBT was initially established as a private company, with a Board of Directors drawn in equal numbers from the broadcasting world and from the Deaf community. In January 2012 it achieved charitable status, retaining the commitment to an equal mix of Deaf and hearing trustees.

## Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Nominations Committee, a sub-committee of the Trustee Board of BSLBT, ensures that the Board and its sub-committees have the right balance of skills and ability to enable BSLBT to carry out its work effectively. It takes delegated responsibility for recommending all new trustees to the Board and re-appointment of Trustees retiring by rotation and eligible for re-appointment.

The Trustee Role description and all vacancies are published on the BSLBT website (www.bslzone.co.uk) in both BSL and English and interviews are also conducted in both languages. The Board agreed in 2016 to add a Person Specification to the role description, and that before any recruitment process the full Board should discuss the vacancy and any priorities that the Nominations Committee should incorporate into the process.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

# Organisational structure and how decisions are made

The Board consists of four Deaf and four hearing people, plus the Executive Chair. The Trustees have four Board meetings per year plus an annual Strategic Awayday. The Board delegates the day-to-day running of the charity to the staff. At its annual Awayday it reviews aspects of the strategic business plan and considers annual objectives, and then monitors progress through quarterly reports at Board meetings.

The Board maintains closer scrutiny of four key areas through its committees:

- Finance & Audit Committee
- Nominations Committee
- Remuneration Committee
  - o Remuneration for senior management (the Executive Chair, the Head of Production & Distribution, and the Head of Content), is considered annually by the Committee with regard to comparators in the charity and broadcast sectors. These salaries have only risen annually by RPI since 2012.
- Commissioning Panel
  - o The Board agreed to disband the Commissioning Panel once the Head of Content was recruited.

The Executive Chair continued to lead the organisation, working with the staff team - the Head of Production & Distribution, the Head of Content, the Programme Manager and the Web Editor.

## Induction and training of new trustees

It is the charity's policy to provide appropriate induction and training for all trustees to enable them to contribute effectively to the governance of the organisation. They are also made aware of their statutory obligations as trustees and provided with opportunities for further training as they deem necessary.

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with Chapter 3 of Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company and the charitable company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

# Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees Responsibilities set out on page eleven, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

## Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the financial statements. # 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Following a review of forecasts and projections, the trustees are satisfied that the charity will continue operations for the foreseeable future and hence the accounts have been drawn up on a going concern basis.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

# Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 25% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are those set aside by the Trustees from unrestricted funds to meet future projects.

# Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

# Financial instruments

The charity only has basic financial instruments. Accordingly, debtors, creditors and cash at bank are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at settlement value. Cash at bank includes cash and highly liquid investments with a maturity date of three months or less.
